Subject: Hudson Canyon Analyses

To support the Council interacting in the process regarding potential designation of a National Marine Sanctuary in the Hudson Canyon area, Council staff requested that NMFS Greater Atlantic Regional Fisheries Office (GARFO) staff conduct revenue/catch analyses in the relevant area. While no specific area has yet been proposed by NOAA, the originally nominated area in the November 2016 nomination seemed like a reasonable area for initial analysis. The GARFO analyses contain a wealth of information on potentially affected species, gears, states, ports, and permits.

We have less information on private recreational activity in the selected area, but informal staff discussions with individuals knowledgeable about recreational fishing indicate that there has also been substantial private recreational activity in the relevant area in recent years.

Table 3.2 of the <u>commercial</u> GARFO analysis, reproduced below, describes the top 10 species in terms of **totaled revenues** (2008-2020) that were reported as being caught from the originally nominated Hudson sanctuary area. Table 10.2 notes that in 2020 the area was responsible for substantial **revenue proportions** of multiple Council-managed species including golden tilefish, black sea bass, longfin squid, summer flounder, scup, and Atlantic mackerel.
