## MEMORANDUM

**Subject:** Inflation Reduction Act Funding – proposed Mid-Atlantic Council project priorities

On October 25, 2023, NOAA Fisheries sent a <u>letter</u> to the regional councils informing them about the availability of \$20 million from the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) to support the development and advancement of "climate-related fisheries management and implementation efforts." An initial \$375,000 will be made available to each Council in year 1 (i.e., 2024) and the remaining \$17 million will be allocated to the Councils, up to a maximum of \$3.5 million for any one Council, based on a competitive project proposal evaluation and ranking process. The larger funding opportunity would release funds to support approved projects from 2024-2026, with all approved projects to be completed by the end of 2027. Funds provided by NOAA Fisheries must focus on fisheries management and governance issues, and not on science and data needs.

Each Council is required to submit their grant applications by December 31, 2023. Grant applications need to include detailed information for projects that will be funded with the initial \$375,000. They also need to provide general information for projects that might be considered for potential future funding up to the \$3.5 million maximum. Submitting information for projects up to \$3.5 million does not guarantee funding but serves as a placeholder to help facilitate the transfer of funds in future years for selected projects. Detailed project proposals for the larger, secondary funding opportunity are due by January 31, 2024.

Council staff have identified nine potential projects – two for the initial \$375,000 and seven for the subsequent funding up to \$3.5 million (Table 1). Many of the project proposals address outcomes and action items identified from the East Coast scenario planning summit and all projects are aligned with IRA funding priorities. The initial two proposals are stock/fishery specific projects that seek to evaluate the challenges and identify potential management strategies to reduce discards and bycatch. The eight proposals for the secondary funding are larger, cross-Council projects that evaluate changes to the existing management framework and increase the Councils adaptive capacity to respond and adapt to a changing climate.

Council leadership and staff are working closely with the other East Coast Councils to

minimize overlap of potential projects and coordinate the cross-Council proposals. Staff are also working with the Atlantic State Marine Fisheries Commission on those proposals that have joint management implications. Council staff will continue to develop the grant application and project proposals to ensure timely submission of all documents by the deadline(s).
