27JAN22: A cutter issued an EAR to a commercial vessel engaged in fishing in the EEZ without an operators permit onboard.



III. Search and Rescue Cases

From December 1, 2021 – January 31, 2022 there were 13 marine casualties/terminations reported involving commercial fishing vessels:

- Allision 0
- Capsize − 0
- Collision 0
- Damage to Environment (Pollution/Hazmat) − 2
 - 29DEC21: A mystery oil sheen was reported in the vicinity of Oriental, NC. A contractor
 was hired by Coast Guard responders to clean up the spill and help prevent further
 environmental impact. The investigation to identify a responsible party is on-going.
 - 19JAN22: A fishing vessel discharged diesel fuel into the water in the vicinity of Point Pleasant Beach, NJ. The responsible party took action to secure the source and effect clean-up; case closed.
- Death/Missing -0
- Fire − 0
- Flooding 2
 - o **12DEC21**: A fishing vessel anchored off NC observed water ingress into the machinery space from a pipe failure. A Coast Guard small boat responded and successfully passed two submersible dewatering pumps to the vessel and repairs were safety made.
 - o **13JAN22**: A fishing vessel was moored in Calabash, NC began taking on water in the machinery space due to a failed bilge pump causing the vessel to sink at the pier. The owner hired a marine salvage company to dewater and refloat the vessel.

 - 07DEC21: A fishing vessel lost propulsion off the coast of Duck, NC and ran aground. A
 Coast Guard helicopter hoisted the crewmembers to safety and the vessel was successfully
 towed off the beach.

- 09DEC21: A fishing vessel ran aground in the vicinity of Avon, NC while engaged in fishing. Another fishing vessel and a Coast Guard small boat were able to tow the vessel off the sand shoal without damages.
- 12DEC21: A fishing vessel grounded near the inlet of Ocean City, MD while transiting inbound to offload catch. The vessel was refloated the next morning at high tide without damages.
- 06JAN22: A fishing vessel ran aground in Newport River, NC due to a submerged rock jetty. The vessel discharged fresh water tanks and transferred fuel tanks, and was able to free the vessel without damages.

- Loss of Propulsion/Steering 2
 - 08DEC21: A fishing vessel reported a broken shaft that resulted in water intrusion.
 Another fishing vessel was able to assist with repairs and provided a tow back to port.
 - 14DEC21: A fishing vessel experienced a loss of propulsion due to an engine casualty
 while trawling off the coast of Chincoteague, VA. The vessel was safely towed back to
 port.

 - o **07DEC21**: A fishing vessel was boarded at sea and the voyage was terminated for fishing without the required amount of survival suits for the number of people on board, not having operational lights, and having an expired hydrostatic release for their life raft.
 - o **18DEC21**: A fishing vessel was boarded at sea and the voyage was terminated for having no fire extinguishers, no EPIRB, and no visual distress signals on board.
 - o **13JAN22**: A fishing vessel was boarded at sea and the voyage was terminated for fishing without a commercial fishing permit and six safety gear violations.
